

Money for your Thoughts

Samuel Brown had it all figured out. A coin collector and employee of the U.S. Mint, he put an ad in the newspaper nearly a century ago, looking to buy a 1913 U.S. a Liberty Head nickel (the five-cent piece produced from 1883-1912). That was the year the Mint had changed the design to feature an Indian Head. The ad created a sensation because no one had known of such a coin.

Brown eventually came forward with the only five nickels in existence fitting the description in his ad -- he had them all along. The details of how the coins came to be are still foggy and involve some unauthorized use of the coin press. As with many rare coins in excellent condition, their value escalated; in this case, the price tag climbed into the millions of dollars. Today, two of the five are in museum collections, leaving just three to the collectors.

One of those three coins spent 30 years in an attic labeled, its not real. The owner, George Walton, had died in a car accident and his family recovered the coin, which was then misidentified as counterfeit. But at the 2003 American Numismatic Association World's Fair of Money in Baltimore, a team of experts authenticated the coin, which sold for over \$4 million.

One of the heirs commented, "The sad part is my mother had it for 30 years and she didn't know it." The new co-owner told ABC News that the takeaway lesson is, there could be a million dollar coin in your closet."


Did You Know ?

Villa Tugendhat in Brno, Czech Republic

A sedate exterior belies the acclaim and turmoil of the past of Villa Tugendhat in Brno, Czech Republic. Architect Mies van der Rohe, known for his a less is more approach, designed the villa for newly-wed and industrial heirs Grete and Fritz Tugendhat. Completed in 1930, its steel-framed, glass and concrete construction expressed the budding Modern Movement through the intersection of its materials, including ebony and onyx, and textures. The interior offered the space and light that were seen as essential to modern living, and a panoramic view of the city.

Villa Tugendhat was known as one of the most influential houses of the 20th century spared the ravages of war. At first used as Gestapo military quarters and offices, it was damaged during combat. In 1967, Grete returned to the villa with experts, aiming to renovate it; however, the Communist era intervened and the new occupants subdivided the villa with pasteboard walls and used the garage as a stable. The Czech Government eventually restored the building which, in the early 1990s, was the site of the signing of the document that divided the country into the Czech Republic and Slovakia.

This home is an outstanding example of the international style in the modern movement in architecture as it developed in Europe in the 1920s. Its particular value lies in the application of innovative spatial and aesthetic concepts that aim to satisfy new lifestyle needs by taking advantage of the opportunities afforded by modern industrial
